United Thank Offering everyday

ON SUNDAY, JUNE 18, ST. BARNABAS CHURCH will hold its United Thank Offering (UTO) Ingathering. The mission of the United Thank Offering is to expand the circle of thankful people. To achieve this mission, we encourage daily prayers, offerings and awareness of the abundance of God's blessings.

The United Thank Offering is a program of the Episcopal Church USA for the mission of the whole church, founded by and administered by women since 1889. The United Thank Offering Committee is entrusted to promote thank offerings, to receive the offerings and to distribute the United Thank Offering monies through grants. The Committee awards and administers these grants within the framework of the policies and procedures of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (The Episcopal Church USA or ECUSA).

UTO is very different from other groups. We are not fundraisers and we do not collect contributions or donations. We do not think of UTO only once or twice a year.

In 2005, UTO awarded 131 grants for a total of \$2,710,247.22. Thirty four grants were awarded outside the United States, seven regional grants, and 90 grants awarded to dioceses within the United States. All of the offering was granted out. The average grant amount was \$20,689. The largest grant was \$85,000.

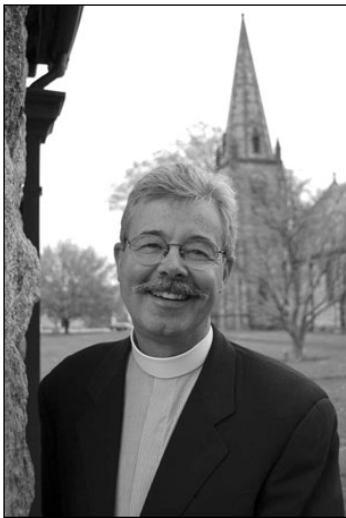

AS WE MOVE INTO THE SEASON OF PENTECOST, we find ourselves focusing on what it is to be the church. The gift of the Spirit, which this season celebrates, has a purpose: to empower us, enable us and encourage us to work together to bring the love, the forgiveness and the justice of God’s reign to the world in which we live. As a community, the Body of Christ, we have all of the gifts, the abilities, which are required. However, we need to respect that every other member is needed. One part of the body that we can too easily take for granted is the staff. We, Saint Barnabas, have a staff of dedicated people who help to support the mission we carry out as a parish. In a parish of our size, the staff is crucial. We are blessed to have both our Administrative Assistant Kathe Rabbitt, ably overseeing the office and coordinating our programs, and Randolph James, our talented director of music and organist, assuring that echoes of the heavenly praise are heard at worship and that we reach out to the community with God’s gift of music to lift many hearts.

Since the fall of last year we have been short-staffed. We did not fill the second clergy position as soon as it became vacant. This was necessary because we did not have enough money in our budget to support this position and we wanted to rewrite the job description to address the present needs of the parish. Even with our well organized “Opening Doors” fall pledge campaign, we were not able to fully fund this position for this year. So in January our Personnel Committee (Paul Gentile, Joyce Harrington, Krista Hennessy and Don Johnson) set about working on job descriptions with the hope that I could hire a new member of the clergy to join our staff come July.

That the Personnel Committee worked on job descriptions for all of our staff proved fortuitous when sexton Edson DeMaura and his family moved to Florida in February. With the quick work of Don Johnson and Harvey Williamson, a job vacancy was advertised and I was able to hire Stephen Paltz as our new sexton. His seamless transition says much about his ability.

Now, I can inform you also that I have hired a new person to join our staff in the second clergy position. We received some 20 applications and resumes. With the help of an Interview Committee (Allison Deyo, Michael Cullen, Sue Davis, Paul Gentile, Sandra Good, Joyce Harrington and Barb Stephens), five applicants were interviewed. Each had gifts and leadership abilities which would have been very helpful to us as a parish. However, the person who had the breadth and balance of qualities to help us in the many facets of our parish program is The Rev. Kate Stebinger. Kate has been with us since the fall, leading our Youth Group and serving as deacon at our worship services. She has now graduated from seminary and will shortly be ordained. Upon joining us in July, Kate will get involved in all aspects of our parish life with special leadership responsibility for Christian Formation (both children and adult) and Youth Fellowship. As a newly ordained priest, Kate’s title will be curate. She will bring great gifts which will help us to be “one body in Christ.” Happy Pentecost!

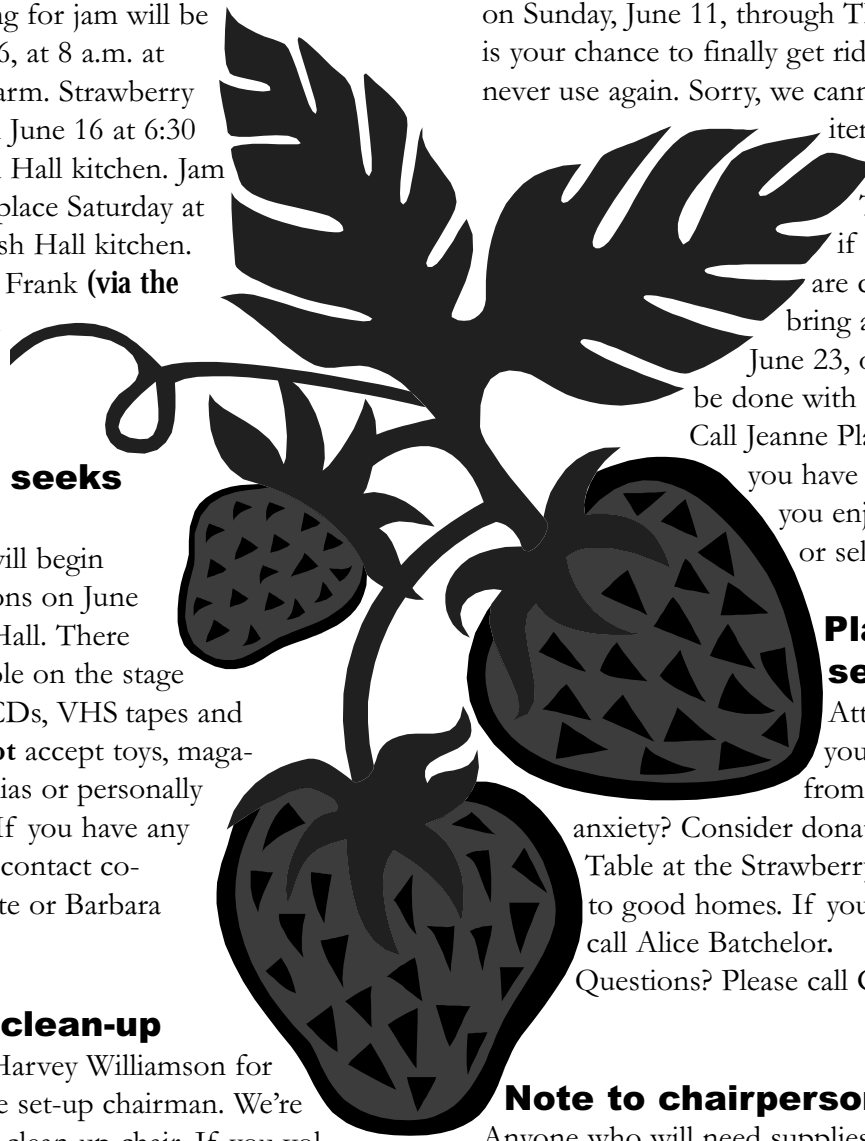

Vestry: Highlights of the May meeting (unapproved)

AS ALWAYS, THE MEETING BEGAN with a meditation to help us shift gears from our busy daily lives to being members of the Vestry. **Paul Gentile** directed this month's meditation, triggered by a phone call from a parent and based on a book by Jeffrey Marx about the life of Joe Ehrmann, called *Season of Life*. The parent shared a dilemma facing many students in high school these days about where to put their effort, athletics or academics. Joe Ehrmann was a professional football player and this book describes how he returned to a more spiritual side of life. He became a high school football coach, a minister and a co-founder of the Ronald McDonald House in Baltimore after deciding that life is about relationships and integrity and not just about who wins or has the biggest house, the biggest salary or the prettiest spouse. He taught his players a particular code of conduct that forms the "moral and ethical foundation of a 'man built for others.'" Paul said it is an amazing book about an amazing man and highly recommends it.

During the time set aside for Vestry members to have the opportunity to share where they've seen or experienced God's presence in their life and work, **Tom Zarle** spoke first about the gift that is his grandson Sammy. Other members of the Vestry talked about God's presence during Holy Week (both here and in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean) and the Triduum services this year and Bob's excellent sermon at the 11 a.m. service on Easter. God's presence was also felt both at the Youth Leadership Academy meeting with its attendant high energy high school spirit.

Jayne Iafrate, editor of the *Banner* and guest of the Vestry this month, discussed the work and joy of getting the *Banner* out every month. Jayne is thankful for the help she gets from the other contributors, many from the Vestry. If she could have one wish, she'd like more parishioners to contribute news, events and perspectives. Both the *Banner* and the Web site are helpful in promoting events, but she needs to know about them in advance. The deadline for all submissions to the *Banner* is the 15th of the month. **Helen Gordon** continued the communications theme by talking about the St. Barnabas Web site, www.stbarnabasfalmouth.org. Helen reported that there is a steady upward trend in the number of people visiting the site. The most often hit areas are sermons, schedules and "What do Episcopalians do?" The policy about pictures on the Web is that we don't identify children or close-ups. The Vestry brainstormed with Helen and Jayne about ways to encourage more parishioner involvement.

Don Johnson gave the monthly Treasurer's Report,

which included the first quarterly report from Merrill Lynch, our new investment manager. Both our cash position and our investments under Merrill Lynch management are improving every month and after this first quarter we were able to transfer some money to the Capital Reserve Fund. This money will be used to deal with specific emergencies and cover what is uncovered. Looking at net total balances of income and expenses, the month-to-date Actual of \$8146 is positive as well as the year-to-date amount of \$8631. Both were negative last year. However, Don reminded us that we have had reduced salary expense through the first four months of this year. We need to be thinking carefully about how to improve our parish commitment to provide for the needs and desires of this church. He said that although the pledge payments are ahead of last year, we still need to obtain a commitment of about \$16,000 to reach our budgeted amount. The Vestry accepted the investment policy by the Finance Committee with Merrill Lynch.

Because the chairman of the Property Committee, **Harvey Williamson**, could not attend the meeting, Don continued with the report from that committee next. The Vestry accepted the committee recommendation to hire Hamilton Tree to inoculate five Elm trees to prevent Dutch Elm disease. A new sexton, Steve Paltz, has been hired. He works 27 hours per week over six days.

The dates for the next Vestry retreat were finalized (March 16-18, 2007) and John Mason discussed plans for the adult parish retreat, Sept. 15-16. This retreat, like the one last year, will be sponsored by the Tuesday night Adult Christian Formation group, but is not limited to those participants. Everyone is welcome.

Discussion of old business included Bob's report on the status of the Search for the new assistant/associate rector. Bob said that when the offer is made and accepted, all concerned parties will find out together. He asks for our prayers. **Kim Strohm**, the co-chair of the Parish Hall renovation committee, reminded us of the July 15 cleanup of the lower hall and BBQ. Helen Gordon gave highlights of the Deanery Report following the May meeting. These included a report from the Diocesan Youth who worked in the Deanery's sister-parish in Biloxi over Spring Break, a report from Bishop Harris' trip to the House of Bishops meeting with its emphasis on removing racism in the church, and a presentation in anticipation of the upcoming General Convention.

Full minutes will be available on the Web after they are approved at the June Vestry meeting.

The order for Compline has changed very little since the 4th Century. St. Benedict included the office in his Holy Rule as composed of three fixed psalms, “the hymn of the hour,” a lesson, a versicle, the Kyrie and a blessing. During the Middle Ages, Compline acquired some of the characteristics of Vespers (the “Ave Maria,” the creed, confession and absolution, among others) and was said at an earlier hour. Henry VIII included a Compline rite in his Primer; the first modern Anglican prayer book to do so was the Irish revision in 1926.

Strategic Planning: We all must play a role

On Sunday May 7 the Vestry began outlining the Strategic Plan for our congregation. During each service summaries of the plan were discussed and interested members of the congregation could then meet with a Vestry member after the services to have their questions answered. The entire plan will be outlined during the first three Sundays in May. This represents a commitment by both the Vestry and our congregation. It is hoped that many of the congregation will “step up to the plate” and assist during the next phase of the planning process—developing action plans.

I want to comment of the term “Strategic Plan.” This term, to many of us, represents a high-brow, academic exercise that should be left to a few like-minded individuals. In reality, this idea is quite far from the truth. The Strategic Plan and the process to implement it is quite simple—use our congregation (who know St Barnabas as well as anyone) to author and work on plans to turn the paper Strategic Plan into reality. My plea goes to each of you: the newcomer, the 30+ year church member, adults, teens, one “who’s done it before” and one who “is afraid to do it” to get involved and sign-up. Very few of us every get a chance to change an institution to what we feel it should be.

Take time to listen to and study the plan and then sign-up at the church picnic (June 11) or before and get involved. A lot of us have said “I wish St. Barnabas could be...,” we now have a chance to say “I had a part in making St. Barnabas something special.” Take time to ask questions and read the document. Election of new presiding bishop on June 18

THE STAGE IS SET to elect the next Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church on June 18, at the 75th General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Columbus, Ohio. The 26th Presiding Bishop will succeed the Most Rev. Frank T. Griswold III, whose nine-year term ends on November 1.

At least seven names will be formally submitted to a joint session of the House of Bishops and House of Deputies on June 17, including a slate of four recommended by the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop.

The nominating committee's slate is:

- the Rt. Rev. Neil Alexander, Bishop of Atlanta;
- the Rt. Rev. Edwin F. Gulick Jr., Bishop of Kentucky;
- the Rt. Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, Bishop of Nevada; and
- the Rt. Rev. Henry N. Parsley, Jr., Bishop of Alabama.

The committee developed a job description, entitled "Call for Discernment," which it mailed to General Convention deputies, bishops and other church leaders, inviting them to submit nominations. It received 24 names in response to the mailing and determined that 22 persons met the criteria for eligibility established by the committee, according to its Blue Book report.

Three other bishops have been nominated and their names will presumably be formally submitted by their nominators, said the Rev. Dr. Gregory S. Straub, Executive Officer of the General Convention.

The additional nominees are:

- the Rt. Rev. Stacy Sauls, Bishop of Lexington;
- the Rt. Rev. Charles Edward Jenkins III, Bishop of Louisiana; and
- the Rt. Rev. Francisco Duque-Gomez, Bishop of Colombia.

Potentially, others could also be included for consideration.

"There is nothing to preclude a bishop or deputy at the joint session from nominating any eligible bishop [those who have a seat and vote] on June 17 and the canons do not allow the nominee to

decline," Straub said.

However, Bishop Ken Price of Southern Ohio, secretary of the House of Bishops, said bishops had agreed earlier this year to refuse to consider any nominees whose names had not been put forward by April 1. The deadline allows time to apply the same medical and psychological screening and background checks undergone by the other candidates.

Straub outlined how the process will continue once Griswold officially closes the nominations. Once the joint session is adjourned, deputies and bishops return to their regular business sessions. The following morning, after Sunday Eucharist, the bishops will convene in executive session at Trinity Church in downtown Columbus near the state Capitol to elect the 26th Presiding Bishop.

"The bishops will debate and vote on the nominees," Price said. "The bishops will be sequestered at Trinity Church. There will be a roll call so we have an exact accounting of who is present, and we elect by simple majority."

A total of 311 bishops are eligible to vote, although not all may be present, Straub said. Bishops will vote as many times as necessary until a majority is achieved. Unlike past elections, vote tallies will be made public.

Once the House of Bishops has chosen the Presiding Bishop-elect, it remains in session until the House of Deputies concurs with its choice. After the deputies concur, the bishops certify the election. The Presiding Bishop-elect will be introduced and will be invited to address both houses and to celebrate Eucharist, but will not officially assume the top position until a November 4 installation service at the Washington National Cathedral.

The Presiding Bishop is elected every nine years as the chief pastor and primate of the church.
