Energy audit underway

CHIEF SEATTLE SAID, "THE EARTH IS PRECIOUS to God, and to harm the earth is to heap contempt on its creator." As Christians, we are charged with the stewardship of all creation. At the Diocesan Convention in October 2006, the delegates approved a resolution that created an Environmental Stewardship Action Plan. All parishes were called upon to conduct an in-house environmental audit of our energy use, consumption patterns and plant use and management, and required to report our results at the next Diocesan Convention, which will take place this fall. Once information is gathered, the Diocese plans to explore buying energy as a diocese, which would provide discounts to parishes.

Saint Barnabas had already begun the work of assessing our energy use in relation to the environment before this fall's diocesan resolution. Ten years ago, and again two years ago, we conducted energy audits and made improvements, including weather-stripping, insulation and double-paning the windows. In the first year, our parish energy bill went from \$21,000 to \$14,000, and we have continued to save.

In response to the diocese's call to action, and our call as stewards of creation, we are working once again to improve our energy use and sustainability as a parish. The Environmental Action Committee has as its action plan:

- to conduct the latest environmental audit (Bill Borden, Kathy Murray) and plant use and management survey (Elizabeth and Bill Dickinson, Ellie Shaver)
- to improve our energy use and environmental stewardship, including instituting a more extensive parish recycling program
- to gather information on local resources and educate the parish about environmentally sustainable efforts (Arline Vernet)
- to work on local efforts for education and outreach

Just as the parish is conducting an audit and changing our environmental attitude, so we can do in our own lives and homes. Your heating and electric companies can help you contact Cape Cod Compact, Inc., which conducts free energy audits in homes and makes recommendations for improvements. As you turn on a light, think about where the power comes from? As you turn on the tap, how many gallons are you using? Gathering information makes us aware, and helps us change. How we live as environmental stewards affects all of God's creation.

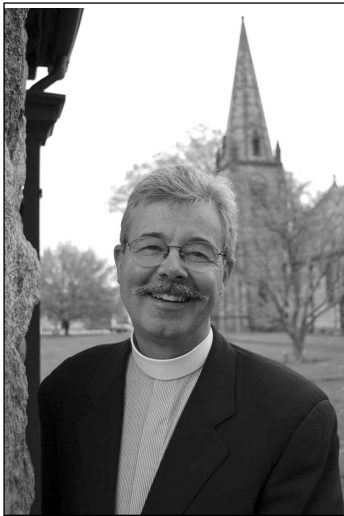

Breaking a familiar pattern

OUR WARDENS AND VESTRY have already begun using a document entitled *Parish Transition Process for the Diocese of Massachusetts*. It contains many helpful points which will help guide Saint Barnabas through the months of discernment which lead to the call of a new rector. I know that the monthly *Banner* and our Web site (www.stbarnabasfalmouth.org) will be useful places to read about the progress which has been made and to help you anticipate what still awaits.

There is one section in the “Parish Transition Process” which is entitled “On Leaving a Parish.” It lists various steps which the clergyperson should take to help ensure that the leave-taking is done well and the parish is in good shape to face the future. There is one item that I think is important to me to state and then explain.

Let the congregation know—in writing—that, while you will remain friends, after your departure you will no longer do pastoral or priestly things with them (even in the interim period), such as leading a service or preaching at a wedding, baptism or funeral. You will come back for a parish event only at the new rector’s invitation, and then in the capacity as the former rector. (p. 22, *Parish Transition Process for the Diocese of Massachusetts*)

I am following that item now, but I believe it needs further explanation.

For 15 years I have been here as your priest and I have relished every minute of it. When you have turned to me for help, God has been vitally present and our relationship has deepened. When we have shared worship together, we have been awed by the movement of the Holy Spirit among us as sermons have spoken to our hearts and as the sacrament nourished our souls. We have grown to trust each other to the point that we could be candid, we could disagree without hurting each others feelings, and we could learn from our different perspectives. You have allowed me to lead this parish knowing that I would not take you anywhere I would not go with you as well. We have richly shared this parish ministry together because you have stepped forward to share the leadership roles. Now, with my retirement in October, we have to break that pattern. It will not be easy because it will take you some time to establish that kind of relationship with first the interim and then the new rector. It always takes time.

My way of best helping you (because I love you) is to not allow myself to fall to the temptation of being your priest again. There will be a new and gifted one who will be here for you. I will continue to keep in touch with what is happening at Saint Barnabas. I will keep you in my thoughts and prayers. But you will have a new rector to turn to. Fifteen years ago my predecessors left me room so that I could enjoy becoming your priest. Now, following their example, I will entrust that privilege to those who follow.

Sharing stories and connections

GREETINGS FROM SOUTH DAKOTA! This is by way of being more of a postcard than an article, and like many postcards, by the time you get it, I'll be home. I am writing from the side of the road (it's amazing what rest areas provide in the way of internet these days) in South Dakota, on my way to Niobrara Convocation, the annual gathering of all the native Episcopal congregations in South Dakota. I'm in a place about as different from Cape Cod and Saint Barnabas as one can get; prairie beneath my feet, big sky above me, and no ocean in sight.

I'll serve the Rosebud Episcopal Mission, made up of eight smaller congregations, mostly Lakota, next week, so their priest can go on vacation, a very different gathering of Episcopalians than Saint Barnabas. Even the names of towns are different. From Falmouth and Mashpee, I'm now driving through Crow Creek, Lower Brule and Fort Thompson. Both places have names partially drawn from the native peoples who were here first, both have Episcopal churches (or I probably wouldn't be here), but I have come about as far from a coast as you can get in the lower forty-eight.

Coming from the Diocese of South Dakota to serve at Saint Barnabas, one of my goals is to make connections between our parish in Falmouth and churches and communities out here. The daily experience of native Episcopalians in South Dakota is very different from our daily experience as Episcopalians in Falmouth, yet we are part of the same church, and worship out of the same Book of Common Prayer. The stories we can share with one another, and the help we can give, can enrich our faith and our lives. Both our youth groups, 6th-8th grade and 9th-12th, will be going to South Dakota next summer to be with some of the churches out here. We will do work projects, but more importantly, we will be stretched by a new perspective on what it means to be Christian, what the call to love our neighbors is really about. I love working at Saint Barnabas; our community has so much to offer! But I also love working in South Dakota; these are rich communities also. I look forward to nurturing a relationship between us in the coming year.

FROM THE VESTRY

Warden Joyce Harrington called the vestry meeting to order at 7:10 p.m. on June 11. There was silent meditation and the Rev. Kate Stebinger said a prayer.

The minutes from both the March and May meetings were discussed and approved. The approved minutes may be found on the St. Barnabas Web site (www.stbarnabasfalmouth.org) and print copies are available in the narthex.

Joyce, Kate, and the Rev. Bob Appleyard presented the Christian Formation report for the past year. Throughout the year, committees and ministries will report to the vestry to give an overview of what has happened or been accomplished, what the committee needs, and what future plans are being considered.

Doris Weeks gave an update on the upcoming Strawberry Festival. New opportunities for fellowship for the summer months were discussed. Treasurer Don Johnson gave an update of the financial statement and the progress of the external audit. Two proposals from the Property and Finance committees involving electrical work for St. Barnabas were approved. In addition, the vestry accepted a donation from Doris (in memory of her mother, Eleanor Fisher) to have the walkway to the lower hall landscaped.

Cynthia E. De Bellis presented a report on the progress of Strategic Plan goals (adopted in June 2006). The approved Strategic Plan with timeline may be found on the St. Barnabas Web site. Printed copies of the Strategic Plan will be available in the narthex.

Joyce led the discussion concerning the Parish Transition Process. In old business, the rescheduling of the vestry retreat was discussed. The meeting concluded with comments without discussion and a final prayer. The meeting was adjourned at 9:24 p.m. The next vestry meeting will be July 9 at 7 p.m. in the Parish Hall (Please note the change in location). Information and proposals for agenda consideration should be given to Bob, Joyce, or Doris two weeks prior to the next meeting. Parishioners are welcome to all vestry meetings.

Search Committee for new rector sought

They will be responsible for planning and facilitating the details of the transition journey for Bob and Debby, for the parish, for our interim rector and for our new rector. That's a lot of detail, so we can all expect to be asked to be of assistance at one time or another.

Appreciative Inquiry: Mark your calendar! Make sure your August plans include being in Falmouth on Sunday, August 19, when the Rev. Cynthia Hubbard will meet with our parish community following our 10 a.m. service to facilitate an Appreciative Inquiry.

An Inquiry is a series of small group conversations in which we as a parish family begin to identify the elements of our own church profile. We will talk about "what's working" and about our dreams and wishes for our faith community. The information from this time together will be the basis or framework from which the Search Committee and the Vestry will generate the documents essential to the search process. It is very important for everyone in our parish community to be an active participant in this exciting, essential activity.

Search Committee: Now it is time for us to call

and select the members of the Search Committee. The Diocesan Guide for Parishes in Transition identifies the "desired characteristics of Search Committee members" as follows: "Good organizational skills; team player; person of prayer; member in good standing; willing to work for the good of the church and not partisanship; no hidden agendas; and can maintain confidentiality." No one committee members will have all the desired characteristics, but together we can discern the will of God for our church community.

"Discern" is a pivotal word. Discernment makes the quest for a new rector radically different from that found in the corporate world. The difference is that spiritual discernment is calling on the Holy Spirit to lead or give direction on a matter. It is how the Spirit shows the church or its people what God wants them to do and be. Discernment is more than just a skill; it is a gift from God, you can become better at it through training and experience. It is more than just a process. Even for the most spiritual matters, there are disciplines, methods, processes and tools that the Spirit can work through to help us discern rightly. Our guide through this process will be our Diocesan liaison, Rev. Cynthia Hubbard.

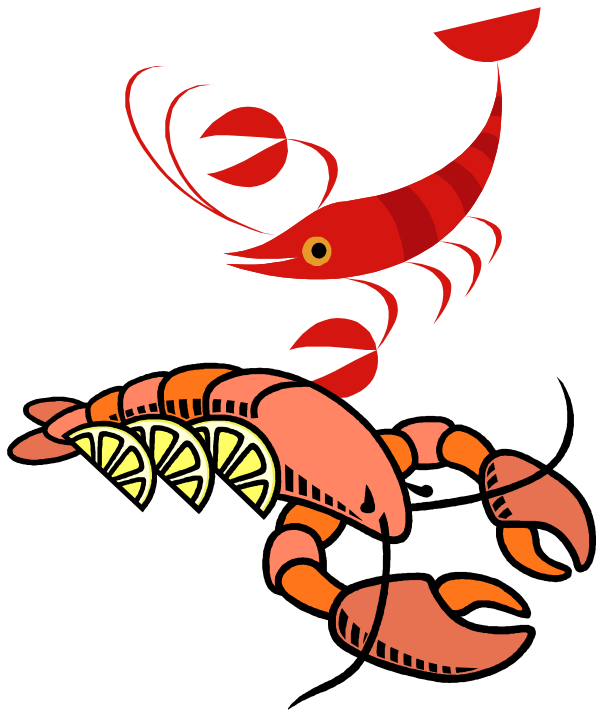
