### Music in worship

## *Spiritually-centered art plays key role in liturgy*

ONE OF THE KEYS IN LEARNING to worship is the understanding that our liturgy functions on many levels of awareness. There is an intellectual component as we study the Scripture and contemplate our relationship with God. There is an emotional component as we express our love and our sorrow and all our other feelings which find a place in the liturgy. And, in the Eucharist, God also speaks to us in ways for which there are no words, to parts of our souls beyond the reach of our conscious mind.

Music is an important tool that assists our worship on all these levels. Speaking to our intellect, music effectively amplifies the words we sing, and the words we hear, words of Scripture and the deep and striking poetry of hymns and choral music. Emotionally, a poignant musical phrase, with or without words, might connect with our feelings, helping us express them more fully.

In our liturgy, we sing more than hymns. *The Psalms*, which were written as a song-book, are often sung or chanted in our services. *The Kyrie, Gloria in Excelsis deo, Trisagion, Sanctus et Benedictus*, and *Agnus dei* (or a Fraction Anthem) is usually sung, and occasionally the Eucharistic Prayer may be sung by the Celebrant and people.

Church music is a spiritually-centered art form that is designed to fulfill specific functions in liturgy. Church music sounds different from popular music, and even from classical concert music, because it has an entirely different function. It is not primarily intended as entertainment. Church music is a form of prayer. The language of prayer is different from the language of entertainment. In every religion, it is known that music

enables us to express that which is otherwise inexpressible. It enables us to touch the central depth of our humanness. It opens a door and enables us to know the presence of God.

As Episcopalians, we have a musical heritage that is one of the worlds richest and most deeply spiritual. For centuries, Anglican Church Music has sought to tell the Christian faith in authenticity and truth. Our music is not a homogenous product, but an extremely diverse and multi-layered art form that celebrates and encompasses many different traditions. You might be interested, when singing hymns, to read the small print below each hymn and note the many and varied sources of the poetry and the music.

When you sing a hymn, and when you listen to the choir sing, always pay attention to and contemplate the printed text, and allow God to use the music to speak to you. In its purest expression, church music can be wordless prayer. Keep your mind and your heart open for something you may not have heard before.

Soli deo Gloria!

## *Will we recognize Him?*

IT IS EPIPHANY, that joyous season when the Magi come and recognize the baby Jesus, showering him with gifts. For children, I recommend highly *The Fourth King* by Ted Sieger. For the adults, I have a different story about Christ, from the Associated Press.

Many of you probably read this story in the papers in the week after Thanksgiving. Jesus was alone in the wilderness. He came upon a little boy, lost and alone, and took care of him. The boy was saved; Jesus was arrested. Of course the story is longer. Manuel Jesus Cordova Soberanes was crossing the desert between Mexico and Arizona to cross the border without documentation, illegally, looking for work in the United States, as he had done many times successfully. On a backcountry Forest Service road, he found a boy and his dog by the side of the highway, his mother dead in the accident he had survived. Manuel found food in the car for the boy, built a fire, and stayed with him until a group of hunters came upon them and called for help. The boy was given into his family's safekeeping, Manuel into the safekeeping of the Border Patrol, pending deportation. For a child, he gave up a chance at a better life, albeit illegal.

Jesus was alone in the wilderness. He came upon a little boy, lost and alone, and took care of him. The boy was saved; Jesus was arrested. I do not tell you this story to offer you my opinion in the immigration debate. I do not know how we find a human answer to such a complex, divisive problem. But the story of a Jesus in the southern desert raises a compelling question. When we, like the Magi, see Christ in our journeying, will we recognize Him, and welcome him with gifts?

### **Education Hour**

## *We are all ministers for one another in worship*

Thank you to all the families who came to our Parent, Teacher, Clergy meeting on November 20. It was wonderful to be able to gather everyone and talk about what you want out of Christian education time and to share what you hoped for the family service here at Saint Barnabas. We want to share what we heard, and tell you more about what our next steps will be.

Both our Education Hour for children and our 9 a.m. service are lively and growing! From you we heard positive feedback about Education Hour. Your children like their classes and their teachers. We would like to expand the programming to provide a class for fifth- and sixth-graders, and we need more teachers to accomplish that goal. We are asking that, beginning in January, parents join a class as a helper every six weeks. On January 9 at 7 p.m., you are invited to an introduction to "Seasons of the Spirit," our Education Hour curriculum. There will be childcare.

As part of our commitment to Safe Church practices, for the protection of our children, beginning on Sunday you

will be asked to sign your children in and out of Education Hour. The Education Hour teachers will have the sign-in sheets in the classroom for you.

Our 9 a.m. service has moved to the Chapel. Some elements of our worship are changing—we are teaching the Nicene Creed as well as the Lord's Prayer, and learning new hymns together. Our children are coming up around the altar table for the Eucharistic prayer, so they can watch closely and participate fully in the prayers before communion. We will continue to shape this service and your input is important. We are all ministers for one another during worship. Please consider how you might be called to participate and pray about whether you are called to serve on the 9 a.m. worship committee, which will begin meeting in the new year. Together, we have the opportunity to explore our faith in new ways within the support and safety of our parish family.

## Staff Profile

### *With varied duties, Kathe Rabbitt loves her job*

Kathe and her husband, Joe, moved to Falmouth in 1985 from Ashland, Mass. While living in Ashland, Kathe was an operations officer for Shawmut Community Bank (now part of Bank of America) and later a vice president of New England Bankcard (Mastercard Processing Company). She attended Saint Andrew's Church in Framingham, where she served as assistant treasurer, a vestry member, a treasurer of their Christmas fair and chair of their 1985 Christmas Fair. Kathe married Joe in 1980 and their two families merged; Joe with his three children and Kathe with her two. Those children have now given them 11 darling grandchildren who are a very important part of their lives.

Kathe began her career at Saint Barnabas on July 1, 1990 as a parish secretary and her job has now evolved to parish administrator. Her job duties have gone from one page of responsibilities to five pages. Kathe has an accounting and banking background, so her duties—preparing financial reports, processing all the checks, handling the payroll, and the payroll quarterly/annual reports for the IRS, including new withholding statements from the employees each year and W-2's for the employees so they can do their tax returns, bank reconciliations, tracking, imputing, and producing pledge statements for the parishioners, adjusting the Merrill Lynch Accounts on a monthly basis to compensate for market fluctuations, and preparing the yearly Parochial Report—are certainly jobs she has been well trained for. Her other administrative duties include maintaining the database of all parishioners, producing mailing labels for the *Banner* and other mailings, doing searches on the database to produce various reports for the clergy and other committees, preparing the Annual Meeting reports, human resources, ordering of supplies, scheduling of lectors and lay Eucharistic ministers, preparing weekly *Bulletins* for three Sunday services, making deposits, updating the *Cape Cod Times* with



schedule changes, checking and responding to all e-mail to the church several times a day, updating the Web calendar, and preparing the in-house monthly calendar, and processing all the received mail on a daily basis. As the primary face of Saint Barnabas for many people, supporting the staff, and handling the public are big parts of her every day function. Kathe is

extremely organized and because of that is able to handle the many and varied job assignments here at Saint Barnabas.

When she came to Saint Barnabas she attended Cape Cod Community College for a year and a half to learn word processing and to develop typing skills so she would have the tools to handle the preparation of weekly Sunday bulletins, the *Banner* (she

acted as editor from 1990 until 2000 with an occasional respite while someone else stepped in for short periods of time) and letters of the parish. Her other education includes attending Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio, and graduating from Williams College School of Banking. In addition to her work at Saint Barnabas, Kathe also works for H & R Block in Teaticket during nights and weekends during tax return season.

Kathe enjoys walking, reading, knitting, traveling, going to the movies, seeing live plays, the Boston Pops and all music, except jazz. She resides in East Falmouth with her husband. You can see them both on Sunday mornings as members of the Canterbury Choir. She is also a lay Eucharistic minister, and a member of the Altar Guild.

She loves her job here and the parishioners of Saint Barnabas. Last May she underwent shoulder replacement and was truly touched by the warmth, love and compassion that many parishioners showed her. Her ministry here has been enhanced and strengthened by her many friends and she is truly grateful for the opportunity to work among all of you.

### *New and familiar faces called to serve on vestry*

**Dick Emerson** has been attending St. Barnabas for over 20 years (primarily at 5 p.m. on Saturdays during the summer). He and his wife Anne have now been full-timers for over a year, since they moved to Falmouth for good in June 2006. They are “normally 8 a.m.” people on Sundays.

Anne and Dick have two daughters living in California: Julie (26) lives in Lincoln and works selling homes in a real estate development company. Lindsey (23) lives in Sherman Oaks and works for The Princeton Review.

They are both retired. Dick spent 34 years in the Sports Medicine Department at Harvard University as an athletic trainer. In his last 14 years, he was the head athletic trainer (supervising and managing a staff of eight). Anne retired in June 2007 from the Quincy Public School system after 33 years of teaching.

Dick was an active parishioner of Emmanuel Church in West Roxbury until they moved full-time to Falmouth. At Emmanuel, he served in many capacities (Sr. Warden, vestry, acolyte, lay Eucharistic minister, lector, parish profile, search committee) before coming to the Cape.

He and Anne have been involved in activities at St. Barnabas. They are both very active in Lobsters on the Lawn. “It’s a great time and fun to be part of,” Dick says. Anne is a regular at Prayer Shawl group, and Debby Gentile does a great job with that group.

Dick’s other activities include playing golf at Pocasset Golf Club, and going on the Board of Governors as chairman of the Golf Committee (“almost a full time job!”).

**Larry Ferreira** is a Falmouth native whose family has attended St. Barnabas for four generations. He is the director of security for the Steamship Authority after retiring with almost 30 years of U.S. government service. He previously has served on the vestry, the last rector search committee, as an usher and parish life committee. He has manned the hot dog grill at the Strawberry Festival since 1989, cooked breakfasts, and served on parish canvases and events. His wife, Sally, is a longtime Altar Guild member, and daughters Alison and Bethany served as acolytes.

**Bob Sherwood** was born and raised in Ohio. His wife, Nancy, grew up in Leominster. They met while he was a soldier at Ft. Devens, Mass., and have one grown daughter, Suzanne, who lives with her husband, Carsten, in Scituate. “No grandchildren yet, but we are hopeful,” Bob says. He graduated from The Ohio State University and University of Dayton. Bob worked for the Department of Defense at Hanscom Air Force Base in several senior management positions; he also spent six years as a management consultant with a Washington, D.C., consulting firm.

Bob and Nancy have been attending St. Barnabas for approximately 2½ years. Prior to that they attended Church of the Messiah in Woods Hole for five years, and before that they were members of All Saints Episcopal Church in Chelmsford for 25 years.

Bob’s principal activity at St. Barnabas is as a lay Eucharistic minister and lay Eucharistic visitor. Nancy “seems to get involved in so many things I can’t keep track,” Bob says. Both were very active in All Saints Church, Chelmsford, where Bob was senior warden, a member of Finance and Personnel Committees, and chaired two search committees for new rectors. They also volunteered at a shelter for the homeless in Lowell, providing a meal for as many as 165 people once every six weeks. In Falmouth Bob is a volunteer at the Senior Center, driving people to medical appointments. He also is a member of Marine Lodge, AF&AM, the Falmouth Masonic Lodge.

### ***Communion is 'gift of God,' Canterbury writes in Advent Letter***

[Episcopal News Service] Calling the Anglican Communion "a gift of God" and describing it as "a voluntary association of provinces and dioceses," Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams has written to the Primates and Moderators reflecting on their responses to the Joint Standing Committee's analysis of the New Orleans statement from the Episcopal Church's House of Bishops.

In his much-anticipated Advent Letter, released December 14, Williams addresses concerns about the escalation of interventions from Anglican leaders into the affairs and common life of other provinces and offers proposals for the next steps in the lead up to the 2008 Lambeth Conference.

Williams vowed to pursue "professionally facilitated conversations between the leadership of The Episcopal Church and those with whom they are most in dispute, internally and externally, to see if we can generate any better level of mutual understanding."

He also intends to convene a small group of Primates and others "to work on the unanswered questions arising from the inconclusive evaluation of the Primates to New Orleans and to take certain issues forward to Lambeth."

Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori welcomed Williams' Advent Letter. "In this season, as we focus on hope and preparation, I am glad to hear of the Archbishop's interest in facilitating further conversations," she said. "While I have repeatedly offered to engage in dialogue with those who are most unhappy, the offer has not yet been seriously engaged. Perhaps a personal call from the Archbishop will bring to the table those who have thus far been unwilling to talk. Advent is both a time to ready our eyes to see God in unlikely guises, and to put our hope in God's ultimate graciousness."
